Thunder Bay Indigenous Entrepreneur Hosts National First Nations Investment Conference

Co-presented by Lac des Mille Lacs First Nation, the Vancouver-based forum features a powerhouse lineup of speakers and ten First Nation investment opportunities.

A Thunder Bay entrepreneur is leading one of the most anticipated new national events advancing Indigenous economic ownership in Canada. The First Nations Investment Forum (FNIF), co-presented by Thunder Bay-based Horizon Seven and Lac des Mille Lacs First Nation, has unveiled its final program—confirming an exceptional lineup of Indigenous and industry leaders, investors, and policy experts shaping the future of Indigenous investment and partnership.

The three-day conference, taking place December 8–10, 2025 at the JW Marriott Parq Vancouver, was conceived by Thunder Bay's own Anthony Maunula, Principal of Horizon Seven and a proud member of Lac des Mille Lacs First Nation.

"I noticed a gap in the conference circuit," says Maunula. "There are plenty of Indigenous business events and forums to discuss major projects, but there wasn't a space designed to truly connect these two worlds. The First Nations Investment Forum brings together First Nation governments,

investors, and industry partners from across Canada to advance Indigenous ownership in major projects."

What began as a local idea rooted in Northwestern Ontario has grown into a national platform connecting communities, capital, and opportunity. The Forum will feature keynote presentations, investment showcases, and ten First Nation-led project pitches across energy, mining, infrastructure, and housing.

This year's program will also spotlight local and regional leadership, bringing speakers, business leaders, and investment-ready projects from Thunder Bay and surrounding First Nations and municipalities to a national stage. Communities and companies from Northwestern Ontario will have the opportunity to showcase their projects, attract investment, and form new partnerships with investors, developers, and government leaders.

To encourage strong regional participation, Maunula is offering First Nations and organizations from Northwestern Ontario a special discounted delegate pass for \$500. This initiative is aimed at helping local communities and organizations showcase their projects while connecting directly with national investors and industry leaders who are seeking new partnership opportunities.

"It's important that Northwestern Ontario is represented at a national level," Maunula adds. "There are incredible examples of partnership, innovation, and Indigenous leadership right here in our region—and this event gives us a platform to share that success story with the rest of Canada."



Investment in the nursing program at Lakehead University will train up to 80 more nurses to connect people to care in Thunder Bay - Atikokan

This investment will help build the pipeline of highly skilled nurse practitioners, registered nurses and registered practical nurses that are needed to meet the growing need for more nurses in Thunder Bay - Atikokan hospitals, long-term care homes, community health centres and primary care clinics. "I'm pleased to see this investment in nursing education in Thunder Bay," said the Hon. Kevin Holland, MPP for Thunder Bay-Atikokan. Ontario Investing \$2.2M to Train More Students at Confederation College for In-demand Jobs in Construction

Investment will train up to 267 more students in skilled trades and urban planning to build a strong workforce in the face of U.S. tariffs

As part of its plan to protect Ontario and deliver on an ambitious infrastructure plan, the Ontario government is investing \$2,238,925 to train up to 267 additional students in construction programs at Confederation College. This investment will strengthen the province's pipeline of highly skilled construction workers that are needed to fulfill the government's ambitious plan to

build more homes, highways, hospitals and other critical infrastructure, no matter what comes our way.

"Our government has bold plans to build the Ontario of tomorrow, and it is critical that we have the homegrown, highly skilled workers to get it done," said Nolan Quinn, Minister of Colleges, Universities, Research Excellence and Security. "From designing roadways to building homes, this investment will ensure our students have the training they need to launch rewarding, indemand careers that protect and strengthen

Ontario's future in the face of economic uncertainty caused by U.S. tariffs."

"I'm happy to see our government investing in construction programming at Confederation College. We need more skilled tradesmen and women to build the critical infrastructure and housing our communities need to grow and thrive." said The



Hon. Kevin Holland, MPP for Thunder Bay – Atikokan. "This investment will help strengthen construction jobs across the region, support local industry, and ensure that students have the training and opportunities they need to succeed right here in Northwestern Ontario."

This investment is part of the Ontario government's \$75M investment to train up to 7,500 students in construction programs such as welding, carpentry and renovation techniques at colleges and Indigenous Institutes and up to 300 new seats for graduate students at universities to train vital urban and land use planners across the province by 2028.

"Confederation College is proud to be part of Ontario's efforts to expand access to education and training in the skilled trades and construction sectors," said Michelle Salo, Confederation College President. "This investment will strengthen our ability to prepare students with the hands-on skills and real-world experience they need to succeed in these high-demand careers. "We seen some really good investments in NW Ontario and have more on the horizon-but the whole the world has been affected by some of the activities happening south of the border. We have to navigate through them. It is unfortunate because we are at the cusp of realizing a lot of opportunities. That is not to say we aren't going to see them happen but as in life you have to adjust to realities you weren't expecting. I'm fully confident we will be able to put the plans in place to stabilize our communities and business in these turbulent times and to position us for the growth once the tide turns and I believe it will turn."

MIchelle Salo, President of Confederation College

"Our international students enrollment is down significantly- 75% compared to 2023. Domestic student enrollment is up a little and our indigenous student enrollment is up which makes us very happy."

"This enrollment situation drives us into a deficit postion this year and going forward so we have taken a number of measure to reduce costs with program suspensions. There is some work we are doing across the province with the Minister to maybe support some funding changes so we are very hopfull."

"We are down a little on international students with our enrollment but we are holding our own and things are going well."

"If you drive along Oliver Road you will see our new Animal Education building is under construction. We are also repurposing some existing space in building for labs, students spaces and offices. I am super excited to see construction under way as it been a long time coming. We should have a completed building next summer."



A bit of history about Westfort.

Westfort Village is a self-contained


shopping district and in fact, many Thunder Bay residents will travel across the city to shop in the unique stores and shops. It is one of the oldest and most famous corners of Thunder Bay.

The community of Westfort, grew up around river traffic and the railway, home for working families. Early business owners established their own busy downtown area, complete with clothing stores, banks, restaurants, hotels, professional offices, pharmacy and food store.

Historic Westfort Village...

This historic village in Thunder Bay was once the focal point of a community that worked at the local grain elevators, factories and in the rail yard. Its proximity to the Kaministiqua River made it an ideal location for the docking of the smaller ships of the time.

There is still extensive evidence of the areas past. Now a unique antique and collectible shopping opportunity, this community of specialty shops makes



an enjoyable destination for Thunder Bay visitors.

By 1883-84 it was clear to all but the residents of Port Arthur that the Montreal-based Canadian Pacific Railway syndicate, in collaboration with the Hudson's Bay Company, preferred the low lying lands along the lower Kaministiquia River to the rocky shores of Port Arthur, and the Company subsequently consolidated all its operations there, erecting rail yards, coal handling facilities, grain elevators and a machine shop. Library services for Fort William began in 1885 when CPR employees opened a bath, smoking and literary room, with a library attached in the Round House,

West Fort William. Fees were \$1.25 per year for CPR employees; outsiders were required to pay \$1.25 for use of the tub.

The Mary J. L. Black Library, 151 West Brock Street, opened in 1938. Mary J. L. Black was the librarian of the Fort William Library from 1909-1937.

She was one of Canada's leading librarians in her day and was the first woman president of the Ontario Library Association. It seems appropriate that the Westfort Branch was named in Miss Black's honour.



City seeking feedback on proposed 2026-2027 capital budget

The City of Thunder Bay has released its proposed 2026-2027 Capital Budget and is inviting residents to share their feedback. This marks the first time the City has presented a two-year capital budget, giving the community a clearer view of planned investments and upcoming infrastructure priorities.

"This new two-year approach helps provide greater stability and certainty for planning, and supports more effective investment decisions," said Keri Greaves, Commissioner of Corporate Services and City Treasurer. "We are encouraging residents to take a close look at the proposed budget and share their thoughts."

Key initiatives in the proposed 2026 Capital Budget include:

• Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI): a system that

supports automated meter reading and earlier identification of leaks.

- Organics and auto cart programs: continued work to support waste diversion and improve collection services.
- Transit electrification: supported by \$6.9 million in grant funding to advance the transition to a lower-emission transit fleet.
- Roads and infrastructure: more than \$34.1 million in roadway improvements planned for 2026, with \$26.5 million proposed for 2027.

Residents can review the proposed Capital Budget and provide input through the public survey available at thunderbay.ca/getinvolved. Hard-copy surveys are also available at Thunder Bay Public Library locations and in the lobby of City Hall.

New this year, residents can also submit questions or comments directly by emailing your.budget@thunderbay.ca, a pilot initiative aimed at making participation easier and more accessible.

The feedback being collected will help the City continue improving the budget process, ensuring information is clear, transparent, and aligned with community priorities.

The area offers elevations of up to 3000 feet and some great snow conditions you might find in more western locations like BC.

Another popular resort destination might be the L'Auberge du Ravage, which is a very unique, large log cabin that features 12-second storey rooms complete with their own bathrooms. Ontario Completes Widening of Highway 11/17

Province opens new lanes from Coughlin Road to Highway 582 and from Highway 587 to Pearl Lake

The Ontario government has completed major construction to widen two sections of the Trans-Canada Highway between Thunder Bay and Nipigon, marking a significant milestone in its plan to twin more than 100 kilometres of the corridor. The project is part of the government's work to protect

Ontario by making record investments in infrastructure that will help support economic growth, keep workers on the job and keep northern communities safe.

Crews have widened Highway 11/17 from Coughlin Road to Highway 582 and from Highway 587 to Pearl Lake.
